

FIELD TRIP OPPORTUNITIES



This course attempts to make two field trips a year, depending on funds. The first is to the Lake County Jail. The students are able to take a tour of the facility, and gain an understanding of the entire incarceration process.

The second field trip is to the Lake County Crime Lab. The students are able to tour the facility, and learn about the different jobs performed there. This facility gives a better understanding of the time and resources used in crime scene investigations.

ABOUT THE COURSE

Grades 10 - 12


2 Semesters

Law Enforcement includes specialized classroom and practical experiences related to public safety occupations such as law enforcement, loss protection services and homeland security. Training is based on standards and content similar to that provided by officially designated law enforcement agencies. Instructions includes procedures for patrolling on foot or in an automobile during the day or at night; dealing with misdemeanors, felonies, traffic violations, and accidents; investigative and evidence collection procedures; making arrests and testifying in court. Oral and written communication skills should be reinforced through activities that model public relations and crime prevention efforts as well as the preparation of police reports.

COURSE DISCUSSION

This course covers the foundation of the criminal justice system including how crime is defined through norms and the law, history and structure of policing, police roles, styles, and functions, ethics, court structure, sentencing, appeals, correction institutions, community corrections, and juvenile justice.

Though the course is focused around the book, it is a very hands on and visual course as well. Such activities include guest speakers, learning police skills, taking tours of criminal justice facilities, and working mock situations. All of these activities aim to increase the knowledge and give those interested in law enforcement an criminal justice careers some hands on experience.
